PURPOSE Saint John's Baptist Church offers the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Scholarship Program to recognize high school students who embrace the ideals of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The program provides financial assistance for high school seniors committed to social justice and demonstrates leadership or active community service participation.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH Submit a one-paragraph biographical sketch describing achievements, community service involvement, current higher education status, and career goals.

ESSAY High school students responding to this year's writing contest should write an essay of no more than 500 words by selecting one (1) of the following topics:

Option A. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. said in a speech in 1963 that "The ultimate measure of a man is not where he stands in moments of comfort and convenience, but where he stands at times of challenge and controversy." What impact can embodying this philosophy have on society, particularly in the face of adversity or injustice? What is the significance of Dr. King's statement in the context of civil rights activism and the challenges faced by today's society?

or

Option B. In his speech titled "The Drum Major Instinct," Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. defined greatness as service and said, "Everybody can be great because everybody can serve." How does Dr. King address the concept of greatness and the desire for recognition in his speech? What are his perspectives on true greatness? How does Dr. King's message in "The Drum Major Instinct" relate to his broader philosophy and approach to activism and social change?

Please include the applicant's name and birth date on the essay for identification purposes.

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SCHOLARSHIP ESSAY WRITING TIPS

SELECT

Select writing topic A or B, not both.

- Familiarize yourself with Dr. King's life. You can accomplish this through research using books, newspaper articles, the internet, and speaking with teachers or librarians who are well-versed in Dr. King's life.
- Relate the topic to circumstances or situations that affect your own life. How does the topic you chose relate to your own life?
- Document all the resources and include them in your bibliography. Include Biblical references where applicable.

OUTLINE

Draft an outline to help organize your thoughts and think about the flow of your paper.

DRAFT

First draft

- Have a teacher, parent, or educator review your first draft.
- Have your reviewer pay special attention to the organization of the paper, the supporting details, and elements that don't make sense to them.
- Update your bibliography.

Edit

- Have a teacher, parent, or classmate review your paper for mechanics (grammar, spelling, punctuation).

Final Draft

- Read the paper out loud.
- Make sure your voice resonates in the paper, your analysis, and your vision for the future.

FINISH

Do not forget to put your name and birth date on the essay.

Relax! Know that you have done your best on your research paper, and it is ready to submit.
